## Crews save Camano hiker

He suffered a heart attack descending Vesper Peak

Randy Belles felt as if a knife had stabbed his heart. "It was such a sharp pain," the 50-year-old Camano Island resident said. "I couldn't move."

Belles and three friends were descending from Vesper Peak in eastern Snohomish County on Sept. 14 when his chest suddenly tightened.

"I loosened the chest straps on the backpack. No relief," said Belles, an avid hiker. "I sat down, began dry heaving and it wouldn't stop. I was breathing, I was conscious, I just couldn't move."

Laying on the trail at the base of the switchbacks to Headlee Pass — about 1.5 miles from the trailhead — he put on extra layers of clothes and took two aspirin. His friends Tony and Nolan set out in a hurry to the Verlot Ranger Station to call 911. His other friend, Tracy, stayed with Belles, building a fire for warmth and to signal a helicopter if the need arose. A solo hiker then arrived and activated a distress signal on his GPS beacon.

## Unlocking Leque

### Letting the water in

In mid-October, crews will start removing the 135-year-old dike surrounding the 250-acre southern portion of Leque Island and allowing seawater to flow into channels dug two years ago. A new 0.75-mile trail off of Eide Road and parking near Davis Slough will provide public access to the site for kayaking, bird-watching or hunting.

Camano Island will soon look more like an island.

Workers will breach the 135-year-old dike surrounding much of Leque Island — the land between Stanwood and Camano Island — in mid-October, allowing seawater at high tide to flood into 250 acres and surround Highway 532.

"There will be tidal marshes on both sides of the highway," said Loren Brokaw, restoration projects coordinator with the state Department of Fish and Wildlife. "Camano will finally feel like an island."

The incoming tide will flow into channels dug two years ago during the first phase of the Leque Island restoration project, led by the WDFW. The channels snake through the former farmland and will even connect to Davis Slough, the existing channel marking the beginning of Camano.

"It's going to look wildly different," Brokaw said. "It'll actually look like what the land originally looked like."

Before settlers started to dike the land in 1886, much of Leque Island was a saltwater marsh that provided habitat for many species, including juvenile salmon. The dike was expanded throughout the years to reclaim land for farming and homesteads.

## Stanwood Camano Food Bank switches to 'grocery store' model

Stanwood Camano Food Bank clients now have more choice.

Rather than stopping by the Food Bank for box of pre-selected items twice a month, customers are now able to browse aisles weekly for fresh produce, dairy, meat and other staples and select what they need.

Food banks nationwide have been moving to a "grocery store" model that allows for greater choice.

The organization made the change in its traditionally slow August and bought new equipment such as shopping carts, executive director Lynne Ayers said.

"These changes to our service model have been a long time coming," she said. "Giving clients more choice not only cuts down on waste but it makes for a much more positive and empowering experience."

Changing to the new model not only meant moving shelves and supplies, but it also required additional training for staff and volunteers, operations manager Kathy Moe said.

The state Department of Natural Resources is looking to trade about 27 acres of trust land in Silverdale in Kitsap County for a roughly 1.5-acre property in Arlington in Snohomish County.

A DNR news release said the exchange will provide long-term revenue for public school construction by exchanging a residential property that earns no income for a commercial property from the Evergreen Housing Development Group that will generate immediate revenue through an existing commercial lease.

Trust lands are held and managed by the Department of Natural Resources for the purpose of generating revenue for both current and future beneficiaries, as mandated by both the Federal Enabling Act and the state Constitution.

Passenger rail expansion called for

A regional transportation planning agency called for an expansion to passenger train service between Seattle and Vancouver, B.C., during a regional rail conference earlier this month.

The North Sound Transportation Alliance aims to support public transit in Skagit, Whatcom, San Juan, Island and Snohomish counties, according to Melissa Fanucci, principal planner with the Whatcom Council of Governments.

Jason Beloso, manager of planning and strategic assessment with the state Department of Transportation's Rail Office, said Amtrak currently operates two round-trip trains per day between Seattle and Vancouver.

But according to modeling from his office a third train will soon be needed as population and usage continues to increase, he said.

## A CLEAN SLATE

Local Camp Fire group washes grave markers in Stanwood

Camp Fire Leader Raylene Levi's heart sank during the American Legion Memorial Day flag ceremony at the Anderson Cemetery this past May. She noticed many of the grave markers were virtually unreadable.

"I walked around the cemetery and was saddened to see that a lot of the markers were almost totally covered with years of dirt and leaves," she said. "I immediately thought that cleaning the markers would be a great service project for my Camp Fire kids."

Camp Fire groups — local chapters of the co-ed youth development organization — are always looking for ways to make a difference by taking on projects that improve things in the Stanwood and Camano community, Levi said.

"I thought it would be wonderful for families who have loved ones buried here to visit and be able to read the markers," she said.

So on a gray Saturday morning in mid-September, Camp Fire members, parents and a few other volunteers set out to clean the grave markers.

Anderson Cemetery, south of downtown Stanwood on Pioneer Highway, has hundreds of graves — many dating back to the mid-1800s.

Not far into the cemetery are rows of gravestones covered in moss and dirt with only a hint of the names and dates carved into the cold granite.

With an expert hand, Levi demonstrated how with a little water and old-fashioned elbow grease, information on the neglected markers were quickly made visible.

"Someone suggested that we use a power washer but I was afraid that might do damage," she said. "There is something peaceful and very satisfying to know that what we are accomplishing this through tough work and love."

The young Camp Fire members are also getting a sense of accomplishment, Levi said.

"I think it would be nice for the families who have relatives buried here to see that the grave stones have been cared for," member Bailey Hansen said. "It makes the cemetery feel more welcoming."

Cassandra Mugleston, who has been a part of Camp Fire since first grade,

also has a positive outlook about the activity.

"I like the fact that we're improving our community and I also enjoy being with my friends doing these service projects," she said.

## Republicans line up for open Senate seat

Republicans in the 10th Legislative District have scheduled a meeting to nominate replacements for outgoing state Sen. Barbara Bailey, and six candidates have expressed interest in the position.

Bill Bruch, chairman of the Skagit County Republican Party, said Republican precinct committee officers will meet Oct. 3 in Mount Vernon to nominate three candidates for the position.

The 10th district includes Island County, southwest Skagit County and northwest Snohomish County.

At a meeting of the three county governing boards, set for Oct. 18, one of the three nominees will be appointed to the seat.

James Golder, a precinct committee officer from Island County, is the only candidate with legislative experience. He served in the Idaho House of Representatives from 1977-1984, according to state documents.

Ron Muzzall, of Oak Harbor, is a managing partner with 3 Sisters Family Farm on Whidbey Island.

Christine Cribb, also of Oak Harbor, is the executive director of the Greater Oak Harbor Chamber of Commerce.

Sara Hyatt, of Snohomish County, is president of Hyatt Development.

Damian Greene, another Island County resident, is a member of the South Whidbey School Board.

Steve Bristow, of Oak Harbor, once served as president of the Navy League of the United States, Oak Harbor Area Council.

Bruch said he is aware of at least one Skagit County resident who is considering entering the race, but has not announced.

# Majority of state small businesses lack a disaster plan

The data is staggering: an estimated one in four businesses won't reopen after a major disaster.

The economic impact is crippling: the loss in revenues, inventory, property, wages and even jobs has an incredible ripple effect on local economies and global supply chains.

The human impact is devastating: the stress and loss that comes from

a disaster can be overwhelming, to say the least.

Yet, studies show an estimated two out of three small businesses – or in some studies as high as three out of four – don't have an emergency plan in place. As we've experienced first-

hand in Washington with wildfires and severe weather across the state, to major disasters like last year's tornado in Kitsap County or the devastating Oso landslide five years ago, it's not a matter of if a disaster will strike, it's a matter of when.

Being prepared for any kind of emergency means a business will rebound sooner with less impact to its financial reserves. Since September is National Disaster Preparedness Month, there is no better time than now to take steps to prepare:

■ Review your hazard and flood coverage to ensure your policy is in effect before a disaster strikes.

■ Keep your insurance policy information, phone numbers for your insurance agent and the claims department handy.

■ Know who you can call to help you clean/rebuild your business and have a restoration plan in place so you can focus on the task of quickly reopening your business.

Preparedness cannot be stressed enough but, once disaster hits, the SBA Office of Disaster Assistance will have staff on the ground within days to coordinate federal, state and local recovery efforts.

Many people I talk to are surprised to learn that in the wake of a declared disaster, the SBA assists in the rebuilding and economic recovery of a community by providing affordable, timely loans to businesses of all sizes, nonprofits, homeowners and renters to cover uninsured losses.

For businesses of all sizes and private nonprofit organizations, the SBA provides up to \$2 million to repair or replace damaged real estate, leasehold improvements, furniture and fixtures, inventory, and machinery and equipment. Economic Injury Disaster Loans are also available to small businesses, small agricultural cooperatives and most private nonprofit organizations that have suffered economic injury caused by a disaster. These loans provide working capital to a business or organization until normal operations can resume.

Take the time this month to put an emergency plan in place using the many no-cost resources (sba.gov) at your disposal.

### 70 YEARS AGO (1949)

Stanwood Cardinal gridiron team defeated Arlington 25-0.

Utsalady Ladies Aid had a Food and Parcel Post sale in East Stanwood.

### 60 YEARS AGO (1959)

Many Stanwood students

attended Skagit Valley College, which had just dedicated a new seven-building campus.

Camano Chamber of Commerce was worried about the algae along the west shore of Camano.

### 50 YEARS AGO (1969)

Foreign Motors opened in Stanwood to serve local car owners so they did not need to go out of town.

The Spartans beat the Meridian Trojans 9-0 in the opening conference game.

### 40 YEARS AGO (1979)

Barry Dreher, wildlife agent, said Camano Island was the

more troublesome area for deer poaching in the north county region.

Warm Beach Manor applied to the county to build a mobile home park near the manor.

### 30 YEARS AGO (1989)

School buses began using letters instead of numbers on buses.

Dr. Edgar Josephson retired after practicing optometry for almost 40 years in Stanwood.

The desire for home rule rekindled talk for a "city of Camano Island."

Women's World was published by the S-C News for the 10th year.

### 20 YEARS AGO (1999)

A required school drug test for students met with a cool reception by school officials here.

Norwegian fjord horses were on display at Village Farmers Market at the Stanwood Pavilion.

### 10 YEARS AGO (2009)

One of the highlights at the third annual Harvest Jubilee in Stanwood was a 42.2-pound squash at Simple Produce Farm.

Stanwood High School had 116 students more than expected, with enrollment at 1,546 instead of 1,430. The district had to add 1.6 full-time teaching positions. The entire school enrollment for September was 4,879 students, a decrease from the 2008 enrollment of 5,009.

Two Camano Island residents were arrested in connection with a drive-by shooting near Milltown.

The humpy run in the Stillaguamish River was the biggest in decades, fishermen said. Humpies are also known as pink salmon.

Former Blazing Saddles owner, Cookie Spirk of Camano Island, and her band celebrated their new CD release at Gerry Andal's Restaurant (now Loco Billy's) in Stanwood.

Toni Bohan of Camano was one of the winners of United Way's prestigious Spirit Awards.

*The Heart of Paul*

Romans 1:14-16: "I am debtor both to the Greeks and to the Barbarians; both to the wise and to the unwise. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also. For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ; for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek."

Paul is saying first that "I am a Debtor," meaning that he was a person with a sense of obligation, akin to the attitude a conscientious person takes toward a bill that is due. A sense of obligation will move a person to take care of business with haste and not procrastinate until the last moment.

Paul's sense that he had an obligation to share the truth of the gospel revealed his next attitude about his own heart, "I am ready to preach the gospel." Because of the debt Paul owed, he prepared himself in every practical way to pay that debt, "So as much as is within me, I am ready to preach." This was not a halfhearted task but he studied, prayed, fasted and listened to others teach the gospel. Paul wanted to be "approved unto God a workman that needeth not to be ashamed."

Finally, Paul said, "I am not ashamed of the gospel of Jesus Christ for it is the power of God unto salvation." Are you ashamed of the gospel? Only one gospel brings conviction, healing and salvation to people. Paul saw the power of God through preaching and teaching the gospel correctly as Jesus taught it. We have an obligation to speak it too.

"Our volunteers have worked incredibly hard and have been flexible with all the changes," she said.

Long-time volunteer Yvette Beloit said the new model allows her to better connect with customers.

"I really enjoy being out in the aisles and interacting with our customers as they browse," she said. "We get to know our families and they tell us what items they like and what doesn't work so well."

Heather, a client who recently visited the Stanwood Camano Food Bank, said the new format is an improvement.

"Giving people the power to choose what they want to eat is wonderful," she said. "I especially enjoy being able to

select the produce that I need. Much of the produce is donated by local growers, and I truly appreciate this."

However, since the food bank is open more, the food bank is in need of more volunteers, Moe said, adding that many regular volunteers leave the area for the winter.

"It takes many hands to make things work here," she said. "We could not provide this level of service to our community without our volunteers. Being a food bank volunteer will change your life for the better."

The Stanwood Camano Food Bank, a nonprofit organization supported by donations and the organization's thrift store, serves over 1,000 community members a month.

But in the past few years, parts of the dike had failed, most recently in 2016.

When crews began the next phase of the project in July and mowed down thick blackberry brambles shrouding the dike, officials discovered parts were only inches wide in places.

"It probably wouldn't have lasted too much longer," Brokaw said.

Because of fears that the dike would fail, WDFW opted to dig channels on the land two years ago in case the ocean busted through onto the land making it inaccessible for heavy equipment, Brokaw said.

"We didn't want to risk the project," he said. "If the dike failed, we wouldn't have been able to do work."

The project, which has been in the works since 2004, has started and stopped several times to address concerns of landowners with nearby wells, hunters and other citizen groups. But officials completed studies and surveys to mitigate concerns, Brokaw said.

Recently, state and tribal officials completed two other nearby estuary restoration projects: a 131-acre site on Fir Island west of Conway and a 107-acre site across the Stillaguamish River from Leque Island called "zis a ba."

The restored saltwater marshes provide habitat for young salmon and other wildlife, including birds.

When complete in mid-October, the

Leque Island site will feature a .75-mile trail atop a new, higher berm meant to protect Stanwood from large waves.

"With water in this estuary, we needed to protect Stanwood from potential wave action," Brokaw said.

At 15.5 feet high, the berm is about 5.5 feet higher than the existing dike and is designed to survive a worst-case scenario event, such as a storm during a king tide. It was built using soil scraped from the site to create low wetland areas at the headwaters of the new channels.

The trail is accessed from a new parking lot off of Eide Road and will feature benches, interpretive signs and places to launch kayaks. The Davis Slough parking lot along Highway 532 will also feature access to a new kayak boat launch.

In addition, Stanwood continues to develop two parks on properties along the Stillaguamish River — Hamilton Landing and Ovenell Park, which will have boat launches.

"The road onto Camano will suddenly have all these easy-to-access recreation opportunities," Brokaw said. Waterfowl hunters will continue to have access to the site, he added.

Puget Sound Acquisition and Restoration Program, National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration, National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, WDFW's Estuary and Salmon Restoration Program, Ducks Unlimited and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service are helping pay for the project.

"We're guessing this is going to be a popular site," Brokaw said.

Randy Belles was transported to Providence Regional Medical Center Everett where doctors quickly confirmed he suffered a heart attack and needed two stents because 40% of his heart's left two arteries were completely blocked.

"I have never had heart issues before — I had never experienced pain like this before, period," he said. "But it does run in the family."

Three years ago, his younger brother died of a heart attack, he said. Randy Belles was luckier. He was released from the hospital Monday and is expected to return to work at the city of Everett's motor vehicle division next week.

Belles said he thought he had escaped the family's heart issues. He eats healthy, exercises regularly and does taxing hikes, such as climbing Mount St. Helens and Park Butte near Mount Baker earlier this year.

"It's crazy how quickly it came on. We were taking selfies just minutes before," he said. "I just want to thank our friends and Snohomish County Search and Rescue for getting me home safe and alive."

However, the misadventure won't dampen his adventuresome spirit, he said. They're already planning to summit Vesper Peak next Sept. 14 to commemorate the "heart attack hike" anniversary, Belles said.

"But my next hike will probably be a shorter one with plenty of people," he said. "Maybe Oyster Dome."

# 40 join international climate strike Friday

About 40 people marched in Stanwood to add their voices to millions of people around the world who marched in small towns and large cities during Friday's Global Climate Strike. The point was to bring attention to the climate crisis in hopes to get world leaders to do something at the U.N. Climate Summit, a three-day session that began Monday in New York.

Michlynn Kahahane heard about the worldwide Climate Strike and wanted to be part of it. With help from Camano Island Democrats, she organized a march in Stanwood, where her children go to school.

"We just came out of the classroom today to be part of the Youth Global Climate Strike. It's an unexcused absence; we already know that. But we're learning by leading, leading by example," Kahahane

said at the march. "My seventh generation is standing up for the next seven generations."

She's referencing the Seventh Generation Principle, which comes from the Native American sustainability practice of considering the effects of today's actions on descendants seven generations into the future.

Stanwood's protesters started at city hall, marched down SR 532 and then Main Street with signs that said, "Save the Planet," "Act Now on Climate Change," "Planet over Profits," "Protect, Restore, Fund" and "There is no Planet B, We Must Act Now!"

The small group waved as passing drivers, who sometimes honked and waved in support. Kahahane hoped that awareness would spread from the march.

"Little changes have big effects," she said.

"We don't know what got to the emergency crews first — the 911 call or the GPS — but all of a sudden you could hear the chopper," Belles said. "Seeing the chopper 100 feet away lifted my spirits."

Belles said he estimates he spent between two and three cold hours on the ground under an emergency blanket before the Snohomish County SnoHawk 10 rescue helicopter arrived just after 5 p.m.

The search and rescue team immediately spotted the smoke from their fire, according to the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office.

"We were lucky because it was too foggy at the top," Belles said. "This was the only clear spot in the hike."

The helicopter dropped off a rescue technician and a flight medic who applied defibrillator patches and inserted an IV into Belles before lifting him into the chopper.

Meanwhile, his wife and son were in Everett and planned to meet him after the hike.

"I came out of the Old Navy dressing room and saw all these messages on my phone from our friends at the Verlot Ranger Station," said Lynn Belles, who hurried to the trailhead. "When we got there, the fire chief said he was conscious, and that's when I knew he would
