

Poulsbo closer to picking art for roundabout

While a final idea has not been determined, the city of Poulsbo recently revealed a proposed design for the Johnson Road roundabout.

The Arts Committee, made up of three city council members and a city staff member plus Mayor Becky Erickson, put out a Request for Proposal in August. It provided a rough idea of what the committee was looking for and the cost, \$150,000.

"The SR305/Johnson Parkway Roundabout Project welcomes residents and visitors to the city of Poulsbo. The chosen

artwork and landscape elements will reflect Poulsbo's eclectic character and community charm, its spectacular location with views of Liberty Bay and the Olympic mountains, and honor Poulsbo's Nordic Heritage.

"As an important gateway, the landscaping and artwork chosen for the SR305/Johnson Parkway Roundabout Project reveals Poulsbo's spirit, as a growing city that at its heart is still the small fishing village on the bay," reads the initial proposal from the Arts Committee.

While the theme fits the intent for the art piece, to be welcoming, the committee has removed the focus

on the Nordic heritage to focus on the shared heritage of city between its Suquamish ancestors and Nordic settlers.

Six artists responded to the request, but the majority focused on the Viking or Nordic aspects. The Arts Committee ultimately chose a team of two artists and asked

them to come up with something new and dig deeper into what Poulsbo is, encouraging Lisa Stirret and Elijah Burnett to visit local museums.

"The bottom line is that this piece is desired to be timeless and generational," said Diane Lenius, Poulsbo

NKSD celebrates first day back

Jan. 11 marked the first day of in-person education this year for many of North Kitsap School District's preschool through second-graders.

Students, teachers and parents were excited for the return, even if it's only with a few of the younger students and only for a few hours at a time.

Students have been broken up into cohorts that either attend morning or afternoon sessions, with a two-hour break in-between each for lunch and cleaning of classrooms and other school facilities.

Depending how things go, older students will be starting up afterward.

Some schools, like Port Townsend, Chimacum and Port Angeles, have been back in school for months, but delays kept happening in Kitsap County do to increases in over COVID-19 positive rates.

Firehouse Theater seeks alternatives to stay afloat

Like so many theaters nationwide, Kingston's Firehouse Theater is fighting for its life amid the coronavirus pandemic and a dying movie industry.

When folks last saw the Firehouse Theater it was getting ready to host its annual Oscars party, with a special twist — the theater was featured on a CBS News special Feb. 9, 2020, ahead of the main show itself.

This national exposure would save the Firehouse Theater, raising over \$180,000 on its GoFundMe page to pay off the cost of new projectors, credit card debt and a second mortgage taken out for owner Craig Smith, as well as provide much-needed upgrades to the theater.

"Business, actually before the Oscars, had started to pick up. That December was my best December, and there seemed to be more

and more interest in my theater. Then that CBS expose' happened, and then it exploded. I had people traveling to come in and shake my hand and visit my theater that ... grew up with these independent movie theaters, and they were all gone where they lived," Smith said.

The GoFundMe, which can be found at www.gofundme.com/f/cbtr6-kingston-firehouse-theater is currently at \$227,535 with a goal of \$300,000 to get the theater in a place where it can be established as a nonprofit.

When COVID-19 hit business just dropped off for Smith, who already had a dwindling audience as more people were using streaming services rather than going to the movies, a move he fears the coronavirus has compounded.

"The big fear is that this industry has been permanently changed," Smith said.

Like a lot of business owners, Smith looked into a few ideas to keep the bills paid and

keep it in people's minds. He looked at what it would take to convert the theater into a temporary drive-in theater, as area drive-ins were seeing a resurgence over the summer of 2020.

city engineer. "The emphasis on culture was very much removed, and it was identified in a broad sense to reflect what everyone sees as important in our area."

Stirret's preferred medium is painted glass while Burnett works in molding metal. The team initially put together a design of a Viking ship to demonstrate their collaborative talents to the Arts Committee, but further conversations with the committee steered the design more toward the shared environmental nature of Poulsbo.

The proposed design put before the council was that of Burnett, a three-dimensional porthole, featuring a forged maple tree and glass or metal

leaves, a heron taking flight over water and non-descript boat.

"Looking through the porthole into the land of the maples," Burnett said to describe the design.

Project engineer Josh Rane described the scale of the proposed design being about 14 feet tall, 12 feet in diameter and weighing 2,000 pounds.

The roundabout is roughly 80 feet in diameter, so a structure big enough to have a presence in the middle of the roundabout is desired, Rane said.

From the road way grading the structure will measure about 20 feet tall, making it quite visible to drivers.

The total cost of the art piece will be between \$100,000-\$120,000, leaving a cushion for landscaping and other elements.

Lenius said the proposed artwork is ready for council and

Suquamish Tribe consideration.

Prior to her presentation the council heard from many, via submitted and virtual public comment, that the roundabout art has to include some form of tribute and consideration from the Suquamish Tribe. The city is trying to repair its relationship with the tribe and make Poulsbo a more welcoming place for tribal members and people of color.

"Despite the misconceptions that are out there, due to multiple reasons, the Arts Committee is very sensitive to the need to have the high view of this art installation and make sure it reflects the passion everyone currently, historically and in the future have for this area," Councilwoman Connie Lord said. "We are determined to honor and reflect the whole community as best we can."

"I had a couple of different groups approach me about that," Smith said. "You can't just pull it off overnight; you can do certain little things on a very small scale."

The cost of the projector needed for a drive-in would be well over \$10,000. Throw in the cost to buy or rent a plot of land, plus audio devices, and it would be a bad short- and long-term investment.

"I love the drive-in theaters around here. I used to take my kids all the time. (I) highly recommend it. But it's also a seasonal thing; it may be open in May, more likely June, and runs until October, and then that's about it," Smith said.

Smith temporarily explored another old school idea of movie rental, but ultimately decided not to do that. Instead, he is looking into

other options such as renting out the theater for small groups and hosting limited events himself.

"We're looking at selling some movie posters here soon. We're going to open up, I think this Saturday, from like 1 p.m.-5 p.m. and sell popcorn (with real butter) and have some posters for sale," Smith said. "I still have to investigate, but we want to offer to rent out the theater space, but if no more than six people can go, I just don't think that's a viable option."

Ultimately Smith is looking to a COVID-19 free future, where the theater can open up, and people can come back and watch movies.

"My hopes are that we get through this by mid-summer, maybe late fall, and ... be open before that with all the limitations and people finally get their vaccines and shake off the fear and get the theater going strong enough with both film and live performances," Smith said.

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

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
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
