continued from page A1 "Any law enforcement agency in possession of military equipment must return the equipment to the federal agency from which it was acquired, if applicable, or destroy the equipment by December

31, 2022." "We have some fully automatic weapons that were given to us by the military that would have to be returned," Escalera added.

If any of the house bill laws are broken, officers face decertification, which could come with major

consequences. To help prepare for the changes, the Police Department has been training officers to help differ from their past habits of reasonable suspicion to probable

cause. "There are some things that are just not going to be a problem. There are some things that are going to be difficult in making the adjustment from," Escalera said.

Since the bill has passed, one officer has resigned, leaving 29 total police officers on the force.
