

Sunnyside School District lays out COVID vax strategy

Accommodations determined for those who opt out

Sunnyside School District staff laid out their COVID-19 protocols for exemptions to Governor Inslee's mandate requiring vaccinations. Staff also announced the

accommodations that will be asked of those who choose to not get the vaccine.

At a Board work session, HR Director Kris Diddens said 64% of district staff are currently fully vaccinated while another 17% said they are in the process of getting it, or plan to get it.

Of the remaining, 11% have said they will ask for an exemption, the vast majority

of which is a religious one and Diddens says one substitute teacher will end their employment.

Some of the Board members raised concerns about the accommodations, something Diddens says they can take back at any time, but "We're taking measures compared to protect the health and safety of our staff and students."

Board President Michelle Perry says that some of the accommodations, stronger masks, limited separation of staff, could "Single out the unvaccinated and set them up for harassment."

Sandra Linde expressed disappointment that the accommodations were made without Board involvement.

Diddens said the measures were not taken light and that

they, "Have to consider both vaccinated and unvaccinated people," and their safety.

She also noted that outside of the one employee, it's unclear how many they'll lose but they are, "Confident we will find a way for most people."

According to the Yakima County Health District, 20% of the COVID-19 case rate has been among school-aged

kids, but Sunnyside Schools is trying to keep more local numbers on a weekly basis.

The accommodations set by the district include: use of an N95 or KN95 mask, continued personal hygiene and physical distancing in classrooms or offices, weekly testing and limited access to areas of the building when masks won't be worn, i.e. lunch rooms or cafeterias.

Future of fire station mural hopeful

Erected shortly after 9/11, it's been stored since 2014

Many Sunnyside residents may remember a mural that was on the side of the fire station shortly after the terrorist attacks on September 11, 2001 but have not seen it recent years.

The mural was commissioned by then Battalion Chief Aaron Markham.

He contacted Gary Kerby, an artist who is originally from Toppenish but had moved to Montana.

Kerby had drawn two of the murals in Toppenish at the time and he gladly took the assignment saying, "I feel [firefighters] should get more recognition than they do."

Kerby remembers the process, in particular noting that as he worked on the mural, the bank across the street had an American Flag flying and that it was "emotional" to see it in light of the attack and that "he had to focus on his job."

He painted on some plywood paneling, not directly onto the building and was "very proud" of how it came out.

It was affixed to the side of the fire station for more than 12 years before a retrofit of the facility was required and it was stored safely to be restored in the future.

After more than seven years, that future has not yet arrived with current Chief Ken Anderson hopeful that it will be able to put back up in some capacity, either outside the

building or in the engine bays.

He believes, "Having the ability to display the complete mural in its full glory would warm the hearts of everyone. The Sunnyside Fire Department strives to be a positive role model and part of the community and public display of the mural represents roughly 118 years of this and serves as a patriotic reminder to our community."

At issue seems to be the nature of the building's ownership which is split between the city and Yakima County Fire District 5.

Officials with YCFD5 did not respond to the Sun's request for comment prior to going to print.

The mural was placed on the north side of the building which is owned by the County who renovated their side in 2014.

At the time, the mural was stored with expectations it would be re-installed once renovations were complete.

Requests to re-apply the mural to the north side have been unsuccessful.

Chief Anderson says there is support to find a solution that could include putting it on the city's side of the building, but still facing north, but the mural would have to be downsized.

Kerby hopes the mural can go back up, and is willing to come back for any touchup work, saying it's important to, "Honor those who perished that day and all of those 20 years since."

State warns of crisis standards of care

The State Department of Health is warning residents that Washington could potentially be forced to implement crisis standards of care in some regions.

That would mean that hospitals in areas where it has been implemented may have to ration care and equipment, potentially focusing on patients more likely to survive.

Yakima Valley Memorial Chief Medical Officer Dr.

Marty Brueggemann says they are at capacity with COVID numbers continuing to climb.

"We are getting more stressed with all of our resources across the board that it only takes one of those resources to break down and you find yourself in that position."

Astria Health spokesman Mike Paoli says they are not in crisis staffing, or standards of care mode.

Currently the Sunnyside facility has 23 acute care patients, of whom 8 have

COVID.

Six of the eight were unvaccinated.

Astria was one of five medical organizations, and more than 140 members of the medical community who signed on to a letter to the County Health District encouraging vaccines and mask wearing.

Areas of northern Idaho recently went into a crisis standards of care response due to increased COVID rates and hospitalizations.

The State Department

of Health says they are working a framework from the National Academy of Medicine that stresses the importance of an ethically grounded system to guide decision-making in a crisis standards of care situation with goal of never having to implement such a drastic scenario.

They are encouraging residents to get vaccinated against COVID-19, wear masks in crowded or indoor public places along with other preventative measures.

Are you sitting up straight?

Let this be a public service announcement: STOP looking down at your phone! Hold your phone UP to eye level! Prolonged device usage can cause faulty posture such as forward neck posture, slouched posture, or rounded shoulders. The frequency of device use, the degree of neck flexion while using the phone, and the body position are some of the main factors associated with neck and shoulder pain and its severity.

How to fix: Keep your elbows to your sides, holding the phone up higher to your face, so you can read it while keeping your head straight. The human head weighs about 10 pounds. The more you tilt your head forward and down, gravitational forces dramatically increase the weight felt by your neck.

By practicing proper posture, you help reduce the risk of back and neck pain. Slouching or hunching at a desk can affect the way your spine grows. Back pain is one of the most common reasons why people miss work.

Sitting and standing with proper alignment improves blood flow, helps keep your nerves and blood vessels healthy, and supports your muscles, ligaments, and tendons. People who make a habit of using correct posture are less likely to experience

related back and neck pain. Some of the benefits of good posture include:

- Reduced back and neck pain.
- Fewer headaches.
- Increased energy levels.
- Less tension in your shoulders and neck.
- Decreased risk of abnormal wearing of the joint surfaces.
- Increased lung capacity.
- Improved circulation and digestion.
- Better breathing. Research shows that poor posture negatively affects your ability to breathe deeply and fill your lungs.
- Improves self-confidence.
- Improved mood.
- Optimal digestion.
- Greater function as you age and grow – especially for kids and adolescents as they are most prone to growing abnormally from bad posture.

As we get older, bad habits such as slouching and inactivity cause muscle fatigue and tension that ultimately lead to poor posture. The complications of poor posture

include back pain, spinal dysfunction, joint degeneration, rounded shoulders, and a potbelly.

So basically, this is a reminder to practice good posture and remind your kids to as well! 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Sunnyside changing building, permit fees

Costs were last updated in 1997

The Sunnyside City Council unanimously voted to update their fee schedules when it comes to building in the city.

Previously fees were based off a structure from 1997 building codes, with valuations from 2008.

Some of the changes will be pretty dramatic with manufacture home permits tripling, swimming pool fees going up five times and a new commercial coach fee.

Council member Julia Hart spoke in favor of the raises noting that it was, “High time our rates caught up,” but wanted to make sure it was done comparably to other towns in the Lower Valley. Interim City Manager



Elizabeth Alba is officially sworn into her position as Interim City Manager by Mayor Francisco Guerrero at Monday night's council meeting.

Elizabeth Alba said that was the plan since if builders are looking to come to Sunnyside, “They want to be in the Valley,” so they won't compare rates against similarly sized cities outside of the area.

During a workshop, Council member Mike Farmer expressed concern about the dramatic increases saying that he agrees they must increase but, “If we start laying a bunch of heavy fees on [building]

maybe they'll go someplace else.”

He later voted to approve the increase when shown the comparison between Lower Valley cities.

Deputy Mayor Dean Broersma said he wants Sunnyside to be known as easy to deal with but did admit that raises were probably needed and that it has been a long time.

Alba says this is a one-time

occurrence and that she wants to build a structure within the city code where there are small, incremental increases on a yearly basis, so the changes aren't as dramatic when they do need to be made.

In other council news: They rejected a memorandum of understanding with the Firefighters Union over updates to the contract after Governor Inslee's mandate that public employees must vaccinated against COVID-19. The MOU would have included a bonus for getting the shot. The council members that voted against the deal said they wanted the word “mandated” to be removed. The city will rework the deal and submit it back to council. The City Council also agreed to make the Sunnyside Sun the Official City Newspaper for 2022.

County Commissioners ban local income taxes

First County in Washington to do so

Yakima County Commissioners approved a ban on local income taxes that could be levied against individuals or businesses.

In a resolution signed in August, they cited that, “A tax would be in direct conflict with the high value the County places on promoting economic development through attraction and expansion of financially healthy, family wage paying employers.”

They are the first County

to pass a ban on income taxes after the State Legislature passed a Capital Gains Tax during the 2021 session that critics have called an income tax.

Seven cities have banned such taxes including Granger, Kennewick, Union Gap and Moses Lake.

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KEEPING YOU INFORMED Proposed Rate Increase

On July 30, 2021, in Docket UE-210593, PacifiCorp dba Pacific Power & Light Company (Pacific Power) filed an advice filing with the Washington Utilities and Transportation Commission (Commission) to implement a rate adjustment to Schedule 91, Surcharge to Fund Low Income Bill Assistance Program, to recover the costs associated with Pacific Power's rate discount program for low-income customers.

This proposed change will result in an overall average increase to Washington customers of approximately 0.9%. A residential customer would see a bill impact of \$1.26 per month. The table below reflects the impact to customers by service type.

The Commission will examine Pacific Power's request. As a result of this examination, the Commission may determine that the schedule should be accepted as filed, modified, or rejected. If accepted as filed, the rate change would go into effect on October 1, 2021.

You are invited to comment to the Commission. The Commission has the authority to set final rates that may be lower or higher than the Company's request, depending on the outcome of its investigation. Syphoning (siphoning) Experiment

A six-step, home, Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math “STEM” experiment by previous high school science teacher, Guillermo V. Castaneda; Granger WA; gvcastaneda@hotmail.com

I documented this experiment for a physics class because I was bewitched by the fact that in comparison to the sprayers that blast water high into the sky using electrical power, this system is one, which might to some observers, seem to perform by magic.

It uses no electricity and contains no mechanical parts, and it blasts no water jets into the sky. Yet, it has proven throughout history to be one of the most effective and reliable irrigators used on rows crops, such as corn. And perhaps most important, once the water has begun to flow onto the crops it will continue to flow –indefinitely. This system – named “siphoning” *Note: This hands on, STEM experiment will improve self-confidence, manual dexterity, patience.*

STEP 1: Set up this experiment as shown with Jar “B,” placed at a lower level than the base of Jar “A.”

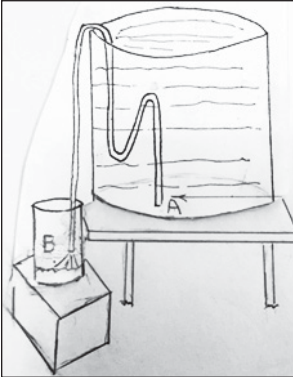
STEP 2: Fill Jar A to two inches below the rim. Step 3: Submerge the entire rubber tubing into Jar A with both hands until all air bubbles are forced out. This fills the tubing with water.

STEP 4: With the entire tube yet submerged in Jar A, hold one end of the tube submerged with one hand, and place the thumb of the other hand tightly over the other end of the tube so that no air bubbles enter the tube when that end is removed from Jar A.

STEP 5: With one hand yet holding one end submerged in Jar A, and the thumb of the other hand holding the tube's other end in Jar A, bring the thumbed tube end out of the Jar A and guide it down into Jar B

STEP 6: Release the thumb from the tubing.

RESULT: Like magic, water will begin to flow into Jar B and will continue to do so until all the water is drained from Jar A. Physics action: Air pressure pushing down onto the water in the Jar A will force the water contained in the tube over the top of the jar. Next, gravity will pull the water down into Jar B. Water continues entering the hose at point “A” and exiting at point “B.” This term, “siphoning” is also referred to as: water seeking its own level.

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
