This is the second motion picture Castaneda has filmed in the Yakima Valley.

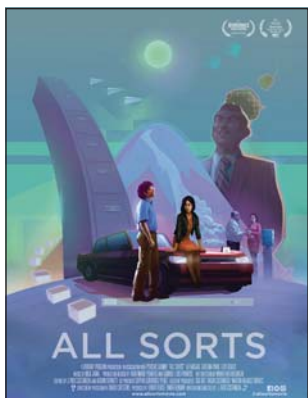

Clean-up underway at Nutrien Ag Solutions

US Ecology, a hazardous waste treatment and disposal company, is heading up the clean-up at the Nutrien Ag Solutions site.

A storage building at the fertilizer facility was destroyed by fire Feb. 28.

Sunnyside Fire Department has determined the cause of the fire as unintentional according to

Chief Ken Anderson. "I'm anticipating discussions with their insurance adjuster so we can determine accurate loss data," said Anderson.

"Nutrien Ag Solutions has been working closely with third party remediation experts and the Washington Dept of Ecology as it manages cleanup of the Sunnyside site. The impacted

dry fertilizer shed and the liquid fertilizer load-out area were newly constructed in the last three years," Leigh Picchetti, communications director at Nutrien Ag Solutions, said in a statement.

Right now there is no estimate length of time when the clean-up will be completed, according to Picchetti.

Yakima Valley College to implement new tools for student services

YAKIMA — This May, Yakima Valley College will introduce new, mobile-friendly tools for students to register for classes, communicate with their instructors and advisors, view financial aid awards, and much more.

“Implementing ctcLink is an exciting step for our college community, especially our students,” said vice president for administrative services, Teresa Rich. “It gives students, faculty, and staff the ability to conduct all of their college business anywhere, anytime. We’re looking forward to giving students a more user-friendly experience with ctcLink.”

YVC is part of the sixth group of Washington state community and technical colleges switching from technology introduced in the mid-1980s to ctcLink. YVC will activate ctcLink on May 9, and staff across campus will set up and transition to the new system before it is ready for students to begin using it on May 19.

Many systems and services will be unavailable while staff work to move thousands of YVC student records to the new ctcLink system. During this time, some offices will be closed and response times to email and phone calls will be longer.

Services impacted include:

- Financial Aid: From May 9-20, YVC's Financial Aid office will be closed

in-person service, calls and emails. Financial aid and scholarship disbursements will not occur between April 22 and May 20. Financial aid applications will begin processing again on May 23.

- Cashiers Office: Starting at 3:30 p.m. on April 22 and running through May 20, YVC's Cashiers Office will be closed for in-person service and unable to accept payments in person, via phone, or online with a credit card.
- Enrollment Services: From May 9-20, Enrollment Services will be closed for in-person and online services including admissions and registration. From 5 p.m. May 4 until May 23, YVC's online application will be closed but prospective students can submit their contact information for notification when the online application reopens. Students should expect longer than usual response times to emails and phone calls.
- Placement/Testing: From May 9-20, placement and testing services will be closed for in-person and online services.
- Advising: Advising will still be available from May 9 – 20 but some advising functions may not be processed until after May 20.

Other college offices that will be closed or have limited hours from May 9 to 20 to focus on the transition include Business Offices,

Human Resource Services and Payroll.

Registration for Summer Quarter will begin using ctcLink on May 31 and registration for Fall Quarter will begin on June 1 for current students.

Students will receive instructions about how to access ctcLink and activate their accounts on May 12. More information about ctcLink is available online.

During the implementation of ctcLink, student coursework in Canvas will not be interrupted.

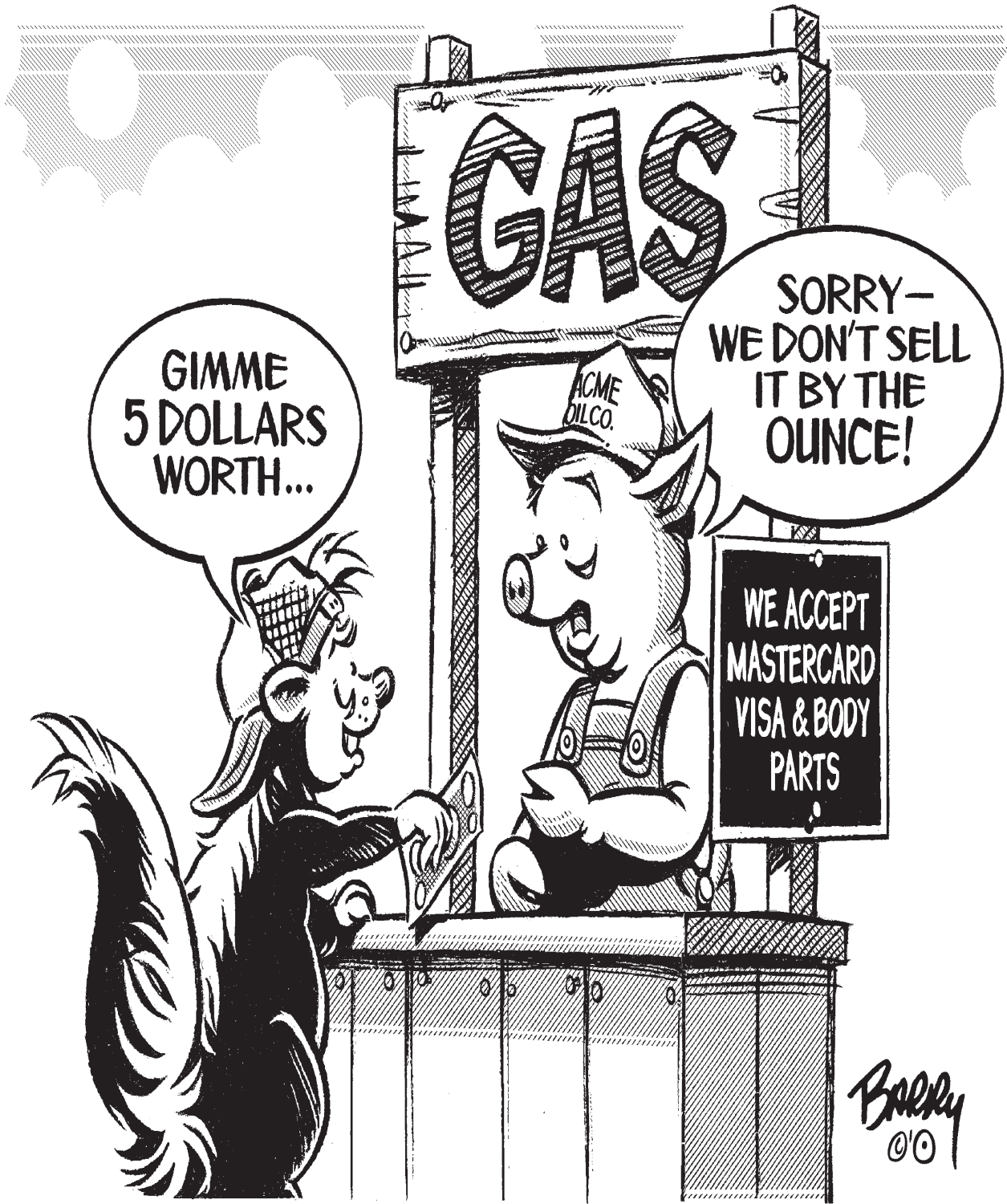

Recent losses remind us to honor our law enforcement officers

It is with a heavy heart that I write this.

Two weeks ago, Pierce County Sheriff's Deputy Dominique "Dom" Calata, a 35-year-old Army veteran who had been with the force for the past six and a half years, made the ultimate sacrifice while protecting his community. While assisting the South Sound Gang Task Force in serving a warrant for second-degree assault, Deputy Calata was shot and killed.

Deputy Calata leaves behind his wife and 4-year-old son.

Tragically, during his memorial service this past Friday, Everett Police Department Officer Dan Rocha was killed during a run-in with a suspect who shot and killed him before running over his body while fleeing the scene.

Officer Rocha leaves behind his wife and two children.

Our nation has seen an alarming spike in the targeting of law enforcement officers—and it is happening in our own backyard. In 2021 alone, 593 officers across the

nation lost their lives in the line of duty.

Let me be clear: nothing justifies the targeting and murdering of law enforcement. Whether on regularly scheduled patrol duty or answering a call for help, law enforcement officers put on their uniforms every day with no guarantee they will return home safely. They swear an oath to protect and defend their communities, and they do so with pride.

Our law enforcement officers deserve nothing less than our full support. I am deeply concerned with the anti-police policies the State of Washington has implemented and continues to consider. While there have been positive steps taken to overturn some of this legislation, I urge the men and women in Central Washington to continue

to contact their state representatives to let them know that you do not support these absurd policies—and that you want our police officers to be able to do their jobs.

Over the past several years, I have had many opportunities to meet with police officers, sheriffs, and first responders across Central Washington. I formed a Law Enforcement Working Group so I could speak with representatives from departments in our district about how we can ensure safety throughout our neighborhoods, cut down on violent crime, and increase trust within the communities.

I've participated in ride-alongs with officers from Pasco and Sunnyside to see firsthand how they interact with their neighbors and local businesses, and I regularly meet with law enforcement officers in each of our counties to learn how I can help them in Congress to make their policing efforts more effective.

I am constantly in awe of the work these officers are doing to engage with families

in need, at-risk children and students, and individuals in danger. They do all of this with the goal of making our Central Washington communities a better, safer place to live and work, and for that, I am grateful.

Police officers around the country are dedicated to protecting us and defend the liberties we hold dear. Law enforcement officers selflessly put themselves in harm's way to protect Americans, preserve the peace, and maintain law and order. They are truly heroes in blue, and we owe them our respect and support

Today, I remember Deputy Calata and Officer Rocha, and offer my sincere condolences to the family, friends, and departments that they left behind too soon. I commit to continuing to fight for the men and women in law enforcement and their families who sacrifice so much to keep our communities safe.

From a young age, Dick learned how to work hard on the family wheat farm and played hard in his free time on any motorcycle he could find. As he got older, his obsession with motors and going fast spread to cars, go-karting with his sons and obtaining his pilot’s license.

Throughout his professional career, Dick found himself in multiple roles at Mercer Ranches, including irrigation, farming operations and in the carrot packaging facility.

He was extremely proud and thankful for the opportunity provided by Bud Mercer and the rest of the Mercer family.

In 1998, Dick started his own family operation, Phinny Hill Vineyards. Using the skills he learned working at Mercer Ranches, Dick built what is considered by many as one of the top wine grape vineyards across Washington State.

Today, Phinny Hill Vineyards is how his legacy will live on, as his sons continue the work he started to produce top-quality grapes for world-renowned wineries in



Washington Wine Country.

As when he was a child working on the wheat farm, Dick continued to work hard on the vineyard, but could also be found playing hard and going fast eventually becoming the engine himself when he began bicycle racing. He dedicated much of his free time to training and becoming a well-oiled machine atop his bicycle.

This love of bicycling continued up until the last weeks of his life, where he would pedal away while sitting in his lounge chair.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Robert Beightol and Gerilee Cruz and his brother, Steven Beightol.

He is survived by a loving

family: his wife of nearly 50 years Cheryl and their two sons Will (Amy) and Brandon (Kim), his brothers Roger (Florence), Robert (Ronda), and Sharon, his in-laws Patricia Hall, Linda (Ed) Bordwell, and Shawn Schaneman. Dick especially prized his four grandchildren Taylor, Ryan, Mia, and Liana.

A Celebration of Life will be held at Prosser Bethel Church 270 N. Gap Rd. Prosser on Thursday, April 7, 2022, at 1 p.m. Reception to follow at the Vermulm Barn at 22236 N Hinzerling Rd in Prosser.

The effects of stress on your body

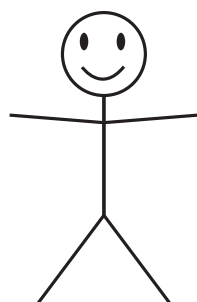

Two vehicle collision results in fatality

A two-vehicle collision in the 600 block of Murray Road resulted in a fatality on Wednesday, March 23, according to a report by the Yakima County Sheriff’s Office Traffic Unit.

At around 10:30 p.m., a single-cab pickup truck occupied by a 20-year-old female and 20-year-old male passenger struck the side of a flatbed trailer. The pickup was traveling east on Murray Road while the semi-truck with a flatbed trailer was backing into a

nearby residence.

The collision caused extensive damage to the pickup truck, and the female driver died instantly. The male passenger was extricated and airlifted to a nearby hospital. His condition is currently unknown.

The cause of the collision is currently under investigation. Alcohol is not suspected, but speed and inattention likely contributed to the collision, according to the report.

School “active shooter” drills traumatic for students

K-12 schools have more guidance on how to conduct active-shooter lockdown drills with a new bill signed into law by Gov. Jay Inslee.

The bill prohibits schools from conducting drills involving life-like simulations or reenactments of active shooter scenarios that are not “trauma-informed and age and developmentally appropriate.” Additionally, students, teachers and staff will be alerted before carrying out a shooting-safety lockdown drill.

Prime sponsor of the bill, Rep. Amy Walen, D-Kirkland, said the legislation is needed to protect staff and students from unintended side-effects of simulation-style drills.

“Active shooter drills are associated with increases in depression, anxiety and fears about death among children as young as five years old, to high schoolers, their parents and teachers,” she said.

In a study conducted by gun safety nonprofit Everytown Research & Policy and the Georgia Institute of Technology, over 95% of schools in the United States practice some form of an active shooter drill.

Additionally, the researchers surveyed students’ social media following the drills and found an increase in words such as “afraid,” “nervous,” and “suicidal.” The research indicated the drills increased depression in students by 39%, increased stress and anxiety by 42%, and increased physiological health problems by 23% in

students from 5-years-old to high school age.

“There is no empirical research supporting the benefits of school-based armed assailant drills with a sensorial experience,” said Lake Washington School District psychologist Kathryn Salveson. “Typical lockdown drills without a sensorial experience do have benefits.”

Walen said the bill was created in response to hearing from parents about how their children were consistently upset after active shooter drills.

At a House Education Committee meeting in February, Walen said her nephew described how shootings were simulated and students were instructed to build barricades during a drill at his high school. “School shootings are

rare, and we should probably not prepare our children to be anxious and afraid at schools,” she said.

Over 40 instances of a gun being brandished or fired in a school setting have been recorded in Washington state since 1990, according to data compiled by the Center for Homeland Defense and Security’s K-12 School Shooting Database research project. However, of the more than 40,000-gun deaths annually in the United States, school shootings account for less than 1%.

The bill will go into effect on June 8, 90-days after the end of the 2022 Legislative session.
