OSNABRUK, Germany - Okanogan graduate Jill Townsend has been signed to play basketball for the Gerolof Panthers of the German Basketball First Division.

Townsend played college ball for Gonzaga University.

She is the second American to sign with Gerolof.

Townsend, 23, averaged 13.5 points and five rebounds per game for the Gonzaga Bulldogs in 27 games last season.

She was named to the West Coast Conference all-star team twice and received an honorable mention for the U.S. all-star team in 2021.

She was conference player of the year in 2019-20.

"Jill is a huge asset to our team and brings us some of the qualities we lacked. She's an excellent long-range shooter, good defender, and good rebellion for her position," said Alexander Kwik, Panthers coach and team manager on broadway.me.

Townsend "has an excellent career at Gonzaga University and we hope that she moves to German basketball with the same success. She fits in well with our current team and will make our team even better. Townsend said she was excited about her new role: 'It's a big club in a great city. My goal is to help the team achieve first place," Kwik said.

CALGARY — Shane Proctor, Grand Coulee, is scheduled to ride in the Calgary Stampede, which runs July

"After an extended absence of rodeo in Canada, top-caliber competition will be back in Calgary, with the Stampede hosting the elite athletes of the sport from both Canada and the United States," said an announcement from the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. "Earlier this month, the federal government gave the Calgary Stampede the go-ahead for a modified quarantine that allows rodeo competitors to safely enter Canada."

Proctor is a former world champion in bull riding. He was sidelined in June when he broke his leg in Ponca City, Okla. According to PRCA, he expected to be out about six weeks.

The rodeo will have the largest purse of any PRCA rodeo this season, except for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo. Prize money of \$250,000 is up for grabs in each event, with a total of \$1.5 million to be won over the event's 10-day run.

Proctor is 22nd in PRCA standings in bulls with winnings this season of \$24,763.26.

Updated state fishing rules pamphlet is online

OLYMPIA — The annual Washington Fishing Rules Pamphlet is now available online for the coming year, detailing fishing rules and regulations for the state's many lakes, rivers, and marine areas from July 1, 2021, through June 30, 2022.

The state Department of Fish and Wildlife said the online regulations are available at https://wdfw. wa.gov/fishing/regulations. Anglers can download the full 2021-22

regulations at https://www.eregulations.com/assets/docs/resources/ WA/21WAFW-LR.pdf.

In addition, the Fish Washington mobile app has the latest regulations. Download information is at https:// wdfw.wa.gov/fishing/regulations/

Paper copies of the pamphlet typically are available at hundreds of license dealers throughout Washington at the end of June. They won't

be available until mid-July because of difficulties obtaining the materials needed to print the pamphlets, due in part to widespread supply-chain issues caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, said the department.

"Not having the pamphlets available by the beginning of the new regulation year is certainly disappointing," said Kelly Cunningham, fish program director with the department. "The online regulations and

the Fish Washington app are great resources, but we know many people still like to have a physical copy of the full pamphlet. We're doing everything we can to work with the vendor on delivery."

The pamphlet is expected to be delivered to dealers across the state the week of July 12.
